INCREASED PRODUCTION SEEN

CUTLER-HAMMER BUSINESS

Rostone Company officials have announced the acquisition of all the Cutler-Hammer cold molding business. Formerly this was a division of the Cutler-Hammer Company in Milwaukee, An agreement has been reached. Mostone will repeive some 300 Cutler-Hammer dies, certain tools, finishing equipment, and machinery, and will supply the moldings to Cutler-Hammer. Included in the transaction are many dies from which Cutler-Hammer produced moldings for other companies.

Initial cataloging of all the tool records, production charts, and customer drawings etc. has begun in the engineering dept. prior to actual arrival of the dies and sample runs. With our latest die numbers being in the 680°s, the new dies will run from 700 to 1000 or 1050.

The Cutler-Hammer Co.
has long been a leader in the
electrical immustry and particularly in the circuit
breaker field, and it is
hoped that this new manufacturing arrangement will be
beneficial to both companies.

HOT MOLDING

Recently Rostone has been doing some hot molding development. This process differs from our standard cold molding, in that the whole dieset is electrically heated to 300°. Instead of pressing with the top head of the press, the top is held closed and pressure is applied thru the bottom ejection cylinder to a slug of material in a transfer cyl-. inder. Under heat and pressure the material flows through a tiny gate into the cavity where it is "set". The molding comes out hot, yet fully cured and tough, Glass fibre filled polyester is the present material.

Some production is expected soon, and in general, great possibilities are seen in the hot molding field where it particularly applies to electrical moldings.

KNOW YOUR PLANT #1

NOTE: Several years ago a series of articles were run on understanding various functions of different departments. This is a repeat of that series beginning with this issue.

THE DIE SHOP

The Die Shop is essentially a machine shop responsible for the care and the
maintenance of the hundreds
of thousands of dollars;
worth of steel dies which,
with the presses, form the
very backbone of our company.
In addition the building of
new dies is becoming more
common as additional machinery is being added.

In the everyday life of the Dis Shop we find the clean up dept. which thoroughly cleans and oil sprays every die as it goes out of production into storage. (A new Vapor Blast Machine will take much of the tedius hand work out of this operation.) Here also a careful inspection turns up cracks or dangerously worm conditions which could result in breakdowns. These go to one of the machinists who will carefully inset a small block of steel to repair a broken corner or make new replacement pins or sleeves - in some cases, complete punches or liners. This becomes diffic cult when you realise that they are dealing with polished surfaces, some practically inaccessible, and steels hardened to where an ordinary file won't cut theme Further skill is required since and ordinary fit between moving punch and stationary liner is .001" (one one thousanth of an inch all around, Ordi-

CONT'D

In addition a stock of small replacement parts is kept for all dies and a continuous chrome plating schedule keeps hard wearing chrome on punches and liners where needed. All finishing dept. grinding and drilling jigs and fixtures, and all insp. dept. gages are manufactured here. In addition several special finishing machines have been built in this dept.

In addition the die shop in conjunction with the engineering dept. is continually experimenting with new steel alloys to try to get longer wear from the dies and also makes many changes in the dies for more efficient pressing.

This, we hope, will give an idea of the part which Jim Cunningham and his men play in operating our plant and its production.

DON'T TRIP OVER THE WELCOME MAT

Give a serious thought to fall prevention in your home, as well as on the job. The stairs are just as steep there, the room is just as tricky, the floor is just as hard, the law of gravity is just as much in effect.

A combined report from ten Ohio hospitals shows that 35% of their home injury cases were caused by falls. Tumbles from roofs, ladders, porches and other high levels, were quite common. Main causes were slipping, stumbling, and overbalancing.

Mark off your stairways as the most extreme danger zone. Eleven out of every 100 home fatalities occur there. This is your cue to:

- (1) Have stairs well lit, with switches at both top and bottom.
- (2) Avoid using stairs as closets. Sweep them clean of sweepers, brooms, clothing, books, magazines, toys.

(3) Have a good solid hand rail, see that every one uses it.

(4) Eliminate or secure scatter rugs at foot or top of stairs. Scatter rugs can scatter humans.

(5) Check regularly for loose treads, worn carpets, highly polished surfaces.
