Matt Room Upgrade

ictured above are most of the people responsible for the installation of the new mass flow meters in the Matt Room.

The installation started the end of summer with Gary Anderson, Sr. Plant Engineer, working with the Maintenance Department (Mel Elliott, Ray Daniels, Jim Gilbert, and Jim Waye), George Clark, Mix Supervisor, and the Matt Operators (Tom Barrett and John Key) trying to

determine the location of the meters and other associated equipment. This new system required that all of the plumbing be changed, as well as all of the programs in the PLC (programmable logic controller). This installation has been completed and the only thing remaining is to fine tune the process to be sure we are using all of its capabilities.

The meters insure that proper ratios of the A side (paste) to the B side (thickener) as well as the C side (pigment) are maintained throughout the production run.

These new process changes will triple our SMC capacity. By using the third stream to pigment, all the holding tanks can be used for storage of unpigmented paste. This amounts to about 40,000 pounds of paste. We will be able to run as much as 50,000 pounds of SMC in one production run. With this added capacity, we can now be competitive in the selling of matt. We have had several inquiries in the past, but chose not to go after the business because of our process. We do have one matt customer, but their requirements are very low and the product is used up quickly.

In the coming weeks, we should start to see a dramatic improvement in our SMC products as Research & Development fine tunes the formulations and the operators become more acquainted with the equipment. Thanks to all who were involved in the installation of this equipment and helped to make the transition to this new process a success.



Labor-Saving Idea Helps Improve our Process

enny Gallivan came up with a great suggestion on how to get rid of all the dust in the Injection area back by the Krauss-Maffei presses, and save the operators a lot of time and effort in

the process.

The operators used to have to carry a 5-gallon bucket of powder up a ladder and dump it into the press hopper every 10-15 minutes. The powder is

very fine and the dust blew everywhere. It got into the computer and all the controls at the press. Shipping was not happy because the dust even came over to their department and settled on all the parts that were ready to be shipped.

Denny remembered how they used gib hoists in Commercial, before they went to augers, to get the powder up above the presses. He suggested they use this system in Injection since they now had extra hoists. It worked great! Now the operator uses this system to hoist 200-pound barrels up over the press hopper and the powder feeds down through a funnel. This powder will last 21/2 to 3 hours leaving the operator with more time for other jobs. Dust is just about completely eliminated, and everyone now appreciates the much cleaner environment.

Denny has been at Rostone for 20 years. He has worked in Commercial Press, Commercial Finishing, the Mix Room and the Matt Room, and is currently an Injection press helper.
